3) There's something for everyone

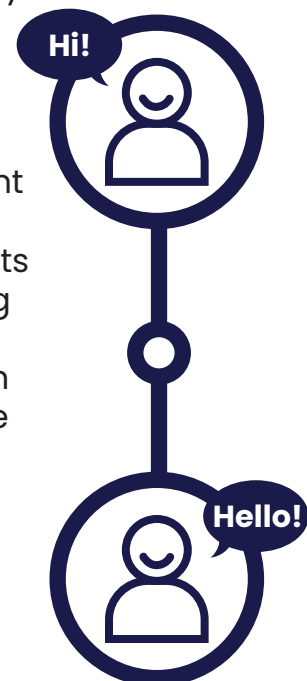
